WELCOME to ROTARY

Rotary is an organization of business and professional leaders united worldwide who provide humanitarian service, encourage high ethical standards in all vocations, and help build goodwill and peace in the world. In 200 countries worldwide, approximately 1.2 million Rotarians belong to 33,000 Rotary clubs.

Rotary club membership represents a cross-section of the community's business and professional men and women. The world's Rotary clubs meet weekly and are nonpolitical, nonreligious, and open to all cultures, races, and creeds.

The main objective of Rotary is service — in the community, in the workplace, and throughout the world. Rotarians develop community service projects that address many of today's most critical issues, such as children at risk, poverty and hunger, the environment, illiteracy and violence. They also support programs for youth, educational opportunities and international exchanges for students, teachers and other professionals, and vocational and career development.

Although Rotary clubs develop autonomous service programs, all Rotarians worldwide have been united in a campaign for the global eradication of polio. In 1985, this project was begun in the Philippines and it was hoped that by 2005, Rotary's centennial year, all children of the world would be immunized. This program has been extended because four countries still have reported cases of polio. In addition to raising \$800 million dollars, Rotary has provided an army of volunteers to promote and assist the World Health Organization, UNICEF and the CDC at national immunization days in polio-endemic countries around the world.

The Rotary Foundation of Rotary International is a not-for-profit corporation that promotes world understanding through international humanitarian service programs and educational and cultural exchanges. It is supported solely by voluntary contributions from Rotarians and others who share its vision of a better world. Since 1947, the Foundation has awarded more than \$1.1 billion in humanitarian and educational grants, which are initiated and administered by local Rotary clubs and districts.

Rotary Club of Welsh Board of Directors*

During Rotary's Centennial year, a large brick welcome sign at the Interstate 10 west entrance into town was constructed. It was a joint venture project between the club and the Town of Welsh. Future landscaping may be possible at the other interstate exchange. The sign included 'Rotary Club of Welsh Centennial Project – 2005' and the Rotary International logo. This serves as a reminder to those entering Welsh how involved the club is in the community.

Demographically Welsh is approximately 77.81% Caucasian, 20.98% percent African American, 0.30% Native American, 0.03% Asian 0.03% Pacific Islander, 0.27% from other races and 0.59% from two or more races. Hispanic or Latino of any race were 1.09%. At present more than one percent of the population of Welsh is a member of the Rotary club. Of the thirty three hundred and eighty residents, thirty are members. The club represents a diverse cross section. The average age is fifty-one years, but younger members continue to be inducted which adds new blood and ideas. More than one out of four is a woman, one out of ten is African American and one is from Sweden. The club represents agriculture, business, the professions, education and retired citizens. Six members reside in other communities, but because of their work belong to the club while two work in Jennings, but enjoy being a part of the Welsh club. Many club members are also involved in other civic, church and school organizations within the community. Four club or honorary members are founding member legacies.

There is a genuine concern for each other and for the town. Members visit, exchange ideas and there is a lively repartee at each meeting. There are interesting programs, great fellowship and camaraderie. There are interesting speakers, birthdays are celebrated, members partake in a great meal and a final word gives food for thought.

As an introduction to Rotary, prospective members are invited to a club meeting. After filling out an application, orientation is provided for the prospective member, the spouse and sponsor. Once they are inducted with their family present, each is put on a committee for club involvement.

Attendance is important, not only at club meetings and projects, but also at District 6200 assemblies and conferences. The club has led the district in attendance at these meetings. The learning experience teaches district goals and those of Rotary International. It ties the club to the family of Rotary.

There is ongoing publicity from the local paper, *the Welsh Citizen*, and Lake Charles television station, KPLC. Because of this, the community has continued to know what the club is doing. A monthly newspaper column was written to inform the public about Rotary both locally and internationally.

The club continues to serve Rotary at the district level: Assistant Governors have been Zula Lyon, Becky Hudson and Dave LeJeune; Vocational Committee Chair was Archie Duplechain; Interact Committee Chair has been Clarence Prudhomme; Membership Coordinators have been Becky Hudson and Jim Wright. Clarence Prudhomme served as District Governor during the 2010 – 2011 Rotary year.

Since the club's inception 75 years ago, Rotary has been an integral part of the Welsh community. A plan of action developed – one that has promoted direction, excitement and continuity. There have been periods of trial and error, but the domino effect has taken place. Club leadership has the support of the board of directors and members. The Rotary Club of Welsh is committed in its efforts to continue the ideals of Rotary during the next millennium.

In the new century more projects have developed which support the community's school system - a \$500 Vocational Technical scholarship to Louisiana Technical College, Rotarian attendance at Interact meetings, each member of the Welsh High School senior class invited to Rotary, high school students tutored, money given to the schools' Accelerated Reader Programs, the 5th grade adopted at Welsh Elementary, pizza provided for its DARE graduation, Rotarians read to Welsh Elementary School children, Welsh Roanoke Junior High Students of the Month are honored, as well as elementary, junior high and high school Students and Teachers of the Year. The club volunteered to serve on the community emergency preparedness program, collected money and goods for Thanksgiving Canned Foods Drive, donated eyeglasses to local Lions' club, participated in town parades and festivals and honored a Golden Age of Welsh Nursing Home resident monthly. This year, the club is sponsoring the Coming Home Festival, as well as manning a coke booth; money raised will be used for various community activities. Welsh Rotarians feed the various athletic teams and INTERACT at the high school. The club and the Greyhound Backers have co-sponsored the Welsh High School Athletic Banquet. It has invited each student from the 5th grade to attend weekly Rotary meetings. The Rotary scholarship has been renamed in honor of the late Dr. P.O. Kramer and has been made into two \$700 scholarships awarded to outstanding seniors from the INTERACT Club. The club has organized a community blood drive and promoted organ tissue donor awareness. The Golden Age of Welsh Nursing Home, along with Rotary, has co-sponsored an annual Senior Olympics for area nursing homes. Volunteers from the club, Welsh High School Interact and the community helped make this event a tremendous success. This year a Good Samaritan Award was initiated to honor a student who shows charity and goodness.

The Family of Rotary has been very important and a Rotarian and his/her family have been honored. *The Thresher*, the club bulletin provides interesting information about Rotary each week. The club helped to sponsor a new club, Sulphur Sunrise in 2001. A club website is available to share information with other clubs throughout the district and world. The club has donated money to help the local Methodist Church providing a Mexico Missions project with school provisions and tuition for young girls. Last year the club will donate \$200 to the Houma Rotary Club Foundation, Inc. for an international water well project and educational component in Haiti.

The late Dr. P.O. Kramer, Zula Lyon, Bob Taylor, Bill Abell, Ronnie Oustalet, Jim Wright, Jimmy Martin, Clarence Prudhomme and Herschel Bourque have received the club's prestigious Rotarian of the Year Award. District service awards were given to Clarence Prudhomme (Four Avenues of Service Citation) and Bill Abell (Centennial Community Service Award). The club sponsored four KPLC Hometown Patriots: Rotarians Bob Taylor, Alex Prudhomme and Cora Mae Vital. Honorary member, Mary Sue Lyon, was also a Hometown Patriot. Money has been collected for various humanitarian causes: PolioPlus – Afghan Children's Relief Fund - Avoidable Blindness - Children of the Dump in Nicaragua – India Earthquake Victims – World Trade Center Relief Victims. District 6200 has awarded 3 club-sponsored Ambassadorial Scholarships to Trey Broadhurst, Jacob Landry and Brennan Arden. 34 of the club's Rotarians are sustaining members, 14 club, 8 family and 2 honorary are Paul Harris Fellows, 7 are Multiple Paul Harris Fellows and 2 are Benefactors. The club has hosted an exchange luncheon with the Jennings club and members wear Rotary designed shirts to club and public events.

Club administration projects that will benefit the Welsh Roanoke communities

Awards two \$700 Rotary – Dr. P.O. Kramer scholarships to two outstanding senior members of Welsh High School Interact Club, sends two Interact members to Camp RYLA, provides the first meal at RYLA with the Jennings and Crowley Rotary clubs, sends students to Boys' State, attend Interact meetings, invites each member of the Welsh High School senior class to Rotary, co-sponsors the WHS athletic banquet, tutors high school students, collects school supplies for children whose parents cannot afford them, supports an active EARLYACT program for students in 4th and 5th grades, adopts a 5th grade class at Welsh Elementary and has them attend weekly Rotary meetings, provides pizza for their DARE graduation, supports an active YOUTHACT Club at Welsh Roanoke Junior High School, honors their Students of the Month, salutes the outstanding Rotarian of the Year, honors the Rotary Club Citizen of the Year, hosts a annual spring picnic for club members and spouses, updates the local club website, sponsors the Coming Home Festival as a fund raiser, collects money/goods for Thanksgiving Canned Foods Drive, works with all youth clubs in a yearly Adopt-a-Road Trash Bash, hosts the traditional Homecoming Gumbo, sponsors the Coming Home Festival and a soft drinks booth, has helped Golden Age of Welsh Nursing Home host Senior Olympics, donates eyeglasses to Roanoke Lions' club, continues the Family of Rotary, donated playground equipment to the Welsh parks, submits a Young Hero's application, participates in town activities, wears Rotary shirts to public events/club meetings and honors Administrative Professionals in the community with lunch, flowers and gifts and takes Veterans from the Welsh Roanoke area to the WWII D Day Museum .

Since the Rotary Club sponsored the Boy Scouts movement in Welsh, the club sponsored a Father and Son Banquet on October 1st in connection with the Scouts court of Honor. Each Rotarian had as his guest a Boy Scout. Every father was invited to be present. The mothers were in charge of preparing the meal and the funds collected would be used to secure a Scout library. Plates were served at 35 cents each.

B. L. Orvis opened the meeting in the "local Rotary fashion" by having the entire group sing "America". The meeting was turned over to the Rev. Jules O. Daigle, chairman of the Boys' Work Committee and Scoutmaster assisted by the assistant scoutmaster, Marion Vallee, who helped conduct the Court of Honor.

At the November 19th meeting the Chairman of the Boy Scout Fund Drive announced that a total of \$225 was the quota needed for the Welsh Chapter of the Boy Scouts. At the December 10th meeting it was decided to collect toys and other articles for the under privileged children. Fr. Daigle volunteered the services of the Boy Scouts in the collection.

In 1939 club activities of the Rotary club included cooperation with the Crippled Children's Unit of Jefferson Davis Parish and members would assist whenever possible to furnish transportation for crippled children to and from the Lafayette and New Orleans hospitals. A Rotary bookshelf was put in the Abbott Hotel. It was agreed unanimously to support the sale of Easter seals.

During the 60 years between 1939 and 1989, the club continued to support the Boy Scouts and constructed a building in which they held their meetings. Many of the club's members honorably served the United States during World War II, the Korean War and the Viet Nam conflict. An annual Adopt a Road Trash Bash was begun. Preparing crawfish etouffee for District 6200's annual Conference Food Fest has become a club tradition. In 1982, the club initiated the Sam Fontenot Memorial Homecoming Gumbo. Fellowship and renewing friendships from the various graduating classes that attend, their families and the community have been outgrowths of this project. Baseball games have been played with the Rotary clubs of Jennings and Sulphur. Each year Administrative Professionals in the community have been honored with lunch, flowers and gifts.

In 1989, women were admitted to the club. Since then there have been five women presidents and two have served as assistant governors. In 1991, Welsh High School Interact Club was founded. INTERACT's involvement in community and international projects has broadened. It is the largest organization at Welsh High School and has participated in every District Interact Conference. In 2006, the club initiated the EARLYACT program for students at Welsh Elementary. In 2008, a YOUTHACT Club was begun at Welsh Roanoke Junior High. The influence of Rotary is found in all areas of the community's educational system.

In RYLA's (Rotary Youth Leadership Award) first year, three Interact members and counselors were sent. Since then one or two INTERACTORS attend each year. Each year, the Jennings, Crowley and our clubs prepare the first meal at Camp RYLA.

In 1995, the club's Citizen of the Year, which honors an outstanding community leader, was begun. Four of the club's members, Cora Mae Vital, Clarence Prudhomme, Becky Hudson and Bob Taylor have been selected for this award.

History of the Rotary Club of Welsh

Chartered – June 5, 1936

Currently – 38 members

Meetings – Thursday – Cajun Tales Restaurant – Noon

On Tuesday, May 26, 1936 a provisional Rotary Club was formed in Welsh and application was made for a charter. The Rice Belt Journal on May 29th stated: For sometime past there has been felt the need of an organization in Welsh composed of the business and professional men of the community. Some of the leaders have given thought to the establishment of an organization with an international hook-up, because of the stability, supervision and outside contacts it would give the community.

Rotarians who sponsored the Welsh organization were from Lake Charles and Jennings. Twenty-five men, representing various businesses and professions made application for charter membership and the following were chosen as the clubs officers for the year: B.L. Orvis, President; C.L. Abell, Vice President and H.T. Prague, Secretary -Treasurer. These officers with the following members composed the Board of Directors: E.F. Hardcastle, E.D. Shipp, George Cousin, Jr. and W.C. Rowland. Weekly meetings were scheduled at 12 to 1 on Thursdays at the Hi Way Cafe.

The first regular meeting was held Thursday, June 5, 1936 with guest speakers and visiting Rotarians explained the Constitution and Bylaws. On Thursday, June 18th the Rotary club met at the Abbott Hotel for the first time. On June 25th it was designated as the "regular luncheon place". At the meetings during June 1936 were visiting Rotarians from Jennings and Lake Charles speaking on subjects pertaining to Rotary and Rotary projects.

On July 23rd Rev. Jules O. Daigle suggested that the Rotarians sponsor the Boy Scouts. At the following meeting on July 30th the club considered the matter and unanimously approved it. Fr. Daigle pointed out that this was a splendid opportunity for Rotarians to put into practice their ideal of "Service to the Community" by assuming the sponsorship of the scouts. This meant, in the future Rotarians of Welsh, both, as individuals and a group would actively promote scouting as one of their special contributions to the community, especially to the boys of Welsh.

On August 11th Rotarians held a donkey baseball game at Sportsman Park for benefit of the Scouts. The funds were to be used to complete the construction of the scout Hut. The donkeys were imported from Dallas, Texas.

On Thursday, August 27, 1936 the Rotary Club of Welsh officially received its charter with 25 charter members. They were: W.C. Rowland, E.F. Hardcastle, George Cousin, Jr., R.J. Troups, F.G. Seward, E.W. Dupre, John T. Hood, H.T. Prague, B.L. Orvis, M.C. Klieman, T.C. Simmons, O.C. Yantis, E.D. Shipp, Reverend. St. Clair Bowers, Roy J. Davis, Dr. J.G. McClure, T.J. Fear, P.E. Wilson, C.L. Abell, J.P. Campbell, Dr. C.A. Martin, J.J. Howard, W.J. Prague, Rev. Jules O. Daigle and Mayor R.R. Arceneaux. Welsh became the 4005th club organized in the United States.

Points of specific action:

Recognizes Welsh Roanoke Junior High School Students of the Month by lunch and picture in the *Welsh Citizen*.

Donates to Jeff Davis Addictive Disorders Clinic with the Jennings Rotary Club contributing the same amount. The money will be used buy to software and material for a parental education program at the local health clinic.

Continues the Family of Rotary committee to assist with club projects and activities in support of club members and non-Rotarian family who are an extension of our Rotary family.

Received a District Grant to buy and assemble playground equipment for Sportsman and Richmond Parks.

Cooperatively provide first evening meal for Camp RYLA with the Crowley and Jennings clubs.

Place new members on committees, which promote immediate club involvement.

Initiated a literacy program in which books bought by Rotarians were distributed to needy shelters by the schools' three service organizations: EARLYACT, YOUTHACT and INTERACT.

Will co-host the 2011 Rotary District Conference in Jennings in March.

Club participation on International Projects that benefit the World

Involves the Welsh High INTERACT Club in programs that will benefit our community, country and the world at large. Continues to support the Sustaining Member program and encourage more members to be Paul Harris Fellows and work towards 100% participation. Donated \$200 to the Houma Rotary Club Foundation, Inc. for an international water well project and educational component in Haiti and \$500 to District 6200 for Haitian relief.

Points of specific action:

Have had a student apply for the Ambassadorial Scholarship and plan to continue having well rounded and scholastically motivated students from our community apply. Jacob Landry was in France during the 2003 – 2004 school year and Brennan Arden studied in Australia during the 2006 academic year.

The club has taken advantage of PDG Lou Capozzoli's match in becoming either a PHF or MPH. Currently 34 of the club's Rotarians are sustaining members, 14 club, 2 honorary and 8 family members are Paul Harris Fellows, 7 are Multiple Paul Harris Fellows and 2 member are Benefactors.
